

## CHAP. 323.

Baltimore shall constitute the second district, and elect two electors, who shall be residents of said district; Baltimore county shall form the third district, and elect one elector, a resident of said district; and Harford county, together with the whole of the Eastern Shore, shall constitute the fourth district, and elect out of the persons residing in said district, three electors.

Sec 2. *And be it enacted*, Except as is otherwise directed by this act, the said election shall be conducted, and the returns thereof made in the same manner as is provided by the act to which this is a supplement.

Sec. 3. *And be it enacted*, That if Maryland by the apportionment bill now before congress should still be entitled to her present number of eleven electors of president, and and vice president of the United States, then this act shall be null and void, and the electors of president and vice president shall be chosen in the manner now prescribed by law.

Governor to issue  
proclamation,

Sec. 4. *And be it enacted*, That the governor be, and he is hereby authorised and directed so soon as the congress of the United States shall have fixed the apportionment of representation, under the census last taken of the people of the United States, to issue his proclamation setting forth the number of electors of president and vice president of the United States, to which the state of Maryland according to such apportionment shall be entitled.

## CHAPTER 323.

Passed Mar. 14, 1832

*An act relating to Free Negroes and Slaves.*

Immigration of  
free negroes forbid

Section 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland*, That after the passage of this act, no free negro or mulatto shall immigrate to, or settle in this state; and no free negro or free mulatto belonging to any other state, district or territory shall come into this state, and therein remain for the space of ten successive days, whether such free negro or mulatto intends settling in this state, or not, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each and every week such person coming into, shall thereafter remain in this state; the one half to the informer, and the other half to the sheriff for the use of the county, to be recovered on complaint and conviction before a justice of the peace of the county in which he shall be arrested: and any free negro or mulatto refusing or neglecting to pay said fine or fines, shall be committed to the jail of the county, and shall be sold by the sheriff at public
