Mr. Jackson, we understand, left town at five o'clock on Sunday morning, with dispatches for Berlin. The French flag of truce, which we announced yesterday, arrived at five o'clock the morning, off Dover. It came over with a packet for Mr. Fox, from the French Minister, M. Talleyrand; in the boat was a Captain in the French army, who had the care of the dispatch, which it is said, was brought by a Courier from Paris; the officer had directions to give it to the first of our cruisers he met with, and it was accordingly, in Dover Roads, delivered to Capt. Tiddy, commanding the Diligence armed ship of war, and forwarded by him to Lord Keith at Ramsgate. The boat set sail with the officer on his return to Boulogne yesterday, soon after seven o'clock. The former circumstance encouraged a hope, that hostilities with Prussia may be avoided; and the flag of truce has been relied upon, in corroboration of the opinion, that a negotiation between this country and France is in train. Yesterday being a holiday at the Stock Exchange, the effect upon the Funds could not be publicly known. We understand, however, that they experienced a very favorable change. Several private bargains were made, and Omnium got up so high as four per cent. premium. The holders of Omnium are very sanguine; and but little of it has been brought to market. The sales were mostly upon speculation. Omnium, this morning, was about 3 per cent. premium.

The communication from the Prussian Government, of the strange measures adopted in the north of Europe, is said to have been civil and obliging; but it is hardly possible to admit any apology for conduct so inconsistent with the independence of one nation, and the duties to others, which that infers. What may be the consequences of the system which Prussia has adopted, it is difficult to conjecture. We are convinced, however, that it will lead to a more intimate concert between this country and Russia, and one far more rational in its object than we yet have seen.

That Denmark will soon be menaced with the same dangers, which have led Prussia into the arms of France, can hardly be doubted; and, if it be possible to defend that country against the force of the combined Prussian and French armies, in the North, not a moment will be lost.—To shut the passage of the Sound, is not only difficult or impossible; but if it were shut, the Great Belt would still remain open. Now, however, that the Prussian influence is rendered active on the side of France, we must lay our account with every effort being exerted against us.

MILAN, March 10.—Prince Borghese, brother-in-law to the Emperor Napoleon, passed through this capital yesterday, on his way to the South of Italy.
PISA, (Tuscany) February 28.—The Spanish troops that were expected under the command of general O'Farrill, have now arrived in the kingdom of Etruria. They are in all 6,000 men strong, and their first column, to the number of 1,000, marched from this city for Leghorn on the 24th, in order to do garrison duty there. The rest of the troops will follow gradually.
Ro E, February 22.—Forty thousand French troops are expected soon to march through this city, as the English and Russians, who embarked at Naples, have re-landed in Calabria, and joined the hereditary prince.—Not less than 70,000 Calabrians have taken up arms and entrenched themselves in the narrow passes and among the mountains.

NEW YORK, MAY 22.
By the arrivals yesterday from the W. Indies, we have a variety of reports relating to the expedition under the command of Gen. Miranda. We insert them all, notwithstanding some of the accounts are vague and contradictory.
Capt. Egery, from Tortola, informs, that the British armed brig Netley, capt. Carr, was to sail the day after he left that place for Antigua; where she was to take in six months provisions, and proceed to join Miranda.
Captain Hinton, of the Jason, in 20 days from Trinidad, informs, that dispatches had been received from Barbadoes, stating that the outward bound Cork fleet had been captured by a French fleet. He also gives as a report, that General Miranda, aided by the English, had landed and taken possession of Caraccas.
Captain Strange, of the Fair American, in 17 days from Guadaloupe, reports that a French privateer had arrived there from the coast of Caraccas, with information that Miranda had landed his troops at Caraccas, and been defeated by the Spaniards.

Captain Clarke, of the ship Huron, arrived yesterday, left Nantz the 20th of April, and informs, that it was reported at that time, that a French army was going to Denmark, for the purpose of compelling the Danes to shut up the Baltic Sound against the British.
May 23.
Several letters received in town from Curracoa concur in stating that Miranda, about the 12th April landed at Aruba, a small Dutch Island in sight of Curracoa, where he exercised and recruited his forces preparatory to his descent on the Spanish Maine. He sailed from thence about the 20th of April.—This news is correct.
Captain Wynkoop, of the Sperry Baker, in 16 days from Porto-Rico, informs,

that he left that place it was reported that General Miranda had effected a landing at Caraccas. That the Spanish government had sent to the City of St. Domingo, requesting assistance from General Ferrand; who sent back word, that he would furnish 500 troops provided a convoy was sent to protect them! In the schooner Splash came passengers Geo. Huxham, Tho. Dyer, and James Oswald, two seamen belonging to the British ship Imperial, of Liverpool, which was captured on the 19 April, by the French privateers L'Esperance and Protecteur. The Imperial belonged to the home ward bound Jamaica fleet. The above privateers captured on the same day the ship Ceres of London, off Cumberland Harbor, but both were retaken by the Atlas of 74 guns. The seamen above mentioned were robbed of every thing, and landed at Cumberland Harbor, then marched to St. Jago de Cuba; and while there the Henry of London, belonging to the fleet, was brought in by a privateer; the crew having mutinied, flogged the captain & ran the vessel out of the fleet. The fleet consisted of 100 sail, under convoy of the Malabar, Scott, of 50 guns; Atlas, of 74; Echo, sloop of war, and 2 or 3 others. May 8th, off Crooked Island, spoke the same fleet again, 26 of whom were missing, 6 of them having been sent to Jamaica, and retaken.

PHILADELPHIA, May 23.
Extract of a Letter from a respectable commercial House at Hamburg, to their correspondent in this city, dated HAMBURG, March 29, 1806.
"By this direct conveyance for your port, we take again the liberty of troubling you with the state of our market, and with our wishes of being favored with the preference of your commands, whenever you should resolve to visit our place with your business. By the annexed list of Prices, you will observe that no great changes have taken place since we addressed you in November last. The great success of the French, the death of Mr. Pitt, and latterly, the uncertainty of Prussia's political situation, have been successive causes, for keeping our trade in suspense, during the winter, and it is reviving just now only, as it appears that our country will enjoy rest, and that the war at sea will be continued.
"With these premises, we venture on giving that opinion of our trade, that it cannot fail to become brisk, so as the interior gets rid of the still existing embarrassments. Coffee has really felt an increasing demand, and though Jamaica, and some other bad qualities, may remain low and heavy, all good coffees promise fairly to continue advancing, so that we can reasonably encourage shipments thereof at 30 cents. With sugar all markets abound, and the prices are so low, that they cannot be expected lower during the war, yet we cannot with propriety expect a rise of much consequence until part of the present stock in Europe will be out of the way. But should you be able to purchase at par with our prices, it would be no risk so to do, and should your country's difference with Spain, not be amicably settled, sugar will deserve attention.
"Cocoa is not likely to get up, as a good deal is on hand, only Caraccas is scarce. Pimento is expected lower, as the prices have declined in England. Indigo may also drop a little for the same reason. Cochineal is likely to advance by and by, as very little of it can be expected. Cottons not much in demand, and we are afraid that no great sale of them can be realized in future, owing to the prohibition of importation of manufactures into France. Of Pepper, the importation has continued to exceed the consumption and according to all prospects, no rise can take place; sales of consequence, are effected to speculators only, and these are of course made at low prices. Much Tea is also on hand, it is however the general opinion, that prices will not suffer more. Rum rather heavy; Fustic very much so, and abundant.—But Logwood has lately taken a start, and is expected to continue at its present value. Rice enjoys a demand at its present price, which is not overrated, and as it appears that corn will keep high, notwithstanding the returning peace, we may advance that the purchases made at Charleston, at 4 dollars will do well here. Of wheat Flour much is expected, and tho' it may be sold at decent prices, yet we would recommend shipments of Rye, and rye Flour in preference. The annexed prices of Tobacco promise to be firm, the stock on hand is not great and a middling supply will not check the market, which is now pretty well answering yours.
"Our Linens are cheaper than last year, and deserve attention."

"THE 5th APRIL.
"As this conveyance has been detained here till this day, we have still to add the important news, that Prussia, has declared all the ports on the North Sea, to be shut against the British trade and shipping. The packets are however to go unmolested, and it is hoped that neutral ships from England, will neither be refused admittance. At any rate, it is confidently expected that England will not blockade our port, and if this expectation proves founded, a brilliant trade, with your, and other neutral country's will be the natural consequence. Large speculations in produce have been made on this account, by which coffee and sugar have advanced 10 per cent. logwood

and fustic, 25 per cent. and most other goods, about 5 per cent. Grain has also risen 10 per cent. as a war in the Baltic is apprehended. Of Coffee hardly any left, and the stock of all other produce is considerably reduced. If you learn from England, that a blockade will take place, it will be highly advisable to ship produce to our port, particularly coffee, sugar, rice, dye woods and spice. Insurance from your country to our port remains, 3 per cent.
