RULES & REGULATIONS,
Made and entered into by the commissioners of the
Western Precincts Market,
FOR THE
BETTER GOVERNMENT THEREOF.
MAY 27, 1836.

1st. Resolved, by the commissioners of the Western Precincts Market, that the hours of said Market shall be as follows, viz:—to begin at day light in the morning, and end at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, on Tuesdays and Fridays, between the 17th of June next, and the first of October, and to begin at 1 o'clock, P. M. and end at sun set, between the first of October, and the first of June.

2d. Resolved, That the clerk of the Market shall have full power and authority to take possession, care and charge of the Market during his continuance in office, and it shall be his duty, and he is hereby directed and required to attend, unless prevented by sickness, or other unavoidable accidents, during the market hours herein before prescribed and at such other hours as shall be necessary to enforce obedience to all and every rule and regulation of the commissioners of said Market, touching or concerning said Market; and to prevent all blown, stuffed, unsound or unwholesome provisions from being sold or exposed for sale, within the same, and to weigh, try, and examine all butter, lard, and other articles of provisions sold at a given weight, to see that the same be of due weight, for which the same shall be offered for sale, and the same when false to seize and dispose of to the highest bidder for the use of the Market to decide all differences and disputes which may arise in the said Market, between buyers and sellers, touching the

weight, and measure of the things there bought and sold, and to examine all persons suspected of selling provisions as Hucksters at second hand and to prosecute according to the present, or any future rules of the said commissioners for the regulations of the market, all such persons as shall be found offending against, the same, and to try all scales, weights and measures, by which any provisions offered for sale in the said Market, are to be weighed or measured and to collect the rent of the stalls or shambles of said market for the use thereof and to cause the said market to be swept at least twice in every week, on the days next preceding market days, and on such other days as the commissioners of said market may direct, and to remove all dirt, filth and Snow, from the same as may be necessary.

3d. Resolved, That all flesh, flour, and other provisions sold by weight shall be weighed by scales and weights duly stamped and regulated by the officer legally appointed for that purpose, and if any person shall be guilty of selling by steel-yards, or by unjust weights or false measures, or scales falsely balanced, he or they shall forfeit and pay a fine of Five Dollars for every such offence.

4th. Resolved, That no person or persons shall sell or expose to sale in the said market any blown, stuffed, unsound, unwholesome meat or articles of provision, or mearsey pork, under the penalty of Five Dollars for each and every such offence.

5th. Resolved, That no person or persons whomsoever, shall lead, ride, drive, or bring into the said market-house or on the brick pavement thereof any horse or other beast, waggon, cart, or carriage of any kind whatever, or kill or slaughter within the limits of said market, any beast of the beef, sheep, or hog kind, or lay, shrow, or deposit any dirt, filth, dung, garbage, or offal therein, under the penalty of Two Dollars for each and every offence.

6th. Resolved, That no person or persons shall expose for sale any goods, wares, or merchandise, of any kind whatever except of the manufacture of the United States within the limits of the said market, or sell or expose for sale any goods, wares, or merchandise of said manufacture, except on market days; and any person or persons offending in either case shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence, the sum of Five Dollars.

7th. Resolved, That if any person or persons shall buy or cause to be bought, any kind of vegetables, dead meats, poultry, butter, cheese, tallow, eggs, or fish in the said market or within ten miles thereof, with an intent to sell the same in the said market, such person or persons shall forfeit and pay for every offence the sum of Five Dollars.

8th. Resolved, That when and as often as it shall happen, that any person is exposing any of the above mentioned articles for sale, otherwise than in his shop or store, and there is good cause to suspect they have been purchased contrary to the true intent and meaning of this rule, it shall and may be lawful for any person to apply to a justice of the peace for Baltimore county, for a warrant to apprehend such person or persons so suspected, and the said justice shall enquire into the offence, and if the person suspected shall be convicted thereof, on the oath or affirmation of one or more credible witnesses, or if the person or persons so charged cannot make it appear to the satisfaction of such justice of the peace, that he, she, or they raised or made the article or articles, by him, her, or them so offered for sale, or that he, she or they are disposing of them on account of the person or persons who may own the same, or that he, she or they brought the said article or articles, tea miles or upwards from the said city, he, she or they shall be deemed, construed, and taken to be offenders against this rule, and shall forfeit and pay the sum of Five Dollars for each and every offence.

9th. Resolved, That no huckster or other person shall purchase, with intent to sell again, provisions or fruits of any kind within the limits of the said market, during market hours, under the penalty of Five Dollars for each and every offence.

10. Resolved, That all waggons, carts, and other carriages, attending the market on market days, shall be placed within the limits of the market during the market hours; and shall be ranged in such manner and form as the clerk of the market shall direct, in one single row on each side of the market house, and as near as possible to the posts or kirb-stones on the sides next the dwelling houses: Provided, That in case all such waggons, carts and other carriages cannot be so ranged in one row, then the residue may be placed in such parts of limits aforesaid, or in such parts of the adjoining streets, as in such manner and form, as to the clerk of the market shall seem right and proper—and any person offending herein shall forfeit and pay one dollar for each and every offence.

11. Resolved, That no waggon, cart or other carriage loaded with wood, stone, bricks, hay, dirt, lime, or lumber or merchandize of any kind or empty waggon, cart, or other carriage and no hackney carriage shall be drove or placed within the limits of the said market during market hours on market days, and that no horses or other beasts of draught not fitted to a waggon or other carriage shall be permitted to enter or remain within said limits during the hours and days aforesaid, and any person herein offending shall forfeit and pay one dollar provided that nothing in this resolve shall be so construed as to prevent any person or persons riding, or driving any horse, waggon, or other carriage across Poca or Green-streets, which intersection shall be kept open for the said purpose.

12. Resolved, That if any person shall use and occupy any stall or shamble in the said market, without having previously rented the same, or hold or retain possession of the same without the consent of the officers (if any) or clerks of the clerk of the market, he shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding five dollars, for each offence.

13. Resolved, That the clerk of the said market shall be, and is hereby authorized and empowered to appropriate spaces and portions within said market, in such manner as to establish fixed stands for the vendors of goods of the manufacture of the United States, stands for the vendors of roots, herbs and vegetables, stands for the vendors of meat, stands for the vendors of country produce, &c. And the said spaces and portions shall be used solely by the persons, and for the uses for which they may be appropriated, and no person or persons attending said market for the said purpose of vending any article of provision, or other article permitted to be sold therein, shall use or occupy any other space or stand, especially appropriated for such person or persons, under the penalty of forfeiting and paying for every offence the sum of five dollars.

14. Resolved, That it be the duty of the clerk of the said market to cause all stalls, shambles, and other parts of the market, to be kept open so that the same be severally opposite to the several avenues of the brick building, the said avenues and all other avenues or footways of said Market-house shall be kept free and clear of and from all obstructions whatsoever, under the penalty of one dollar for each and every offence.

15. Resolved, That no person or persons shall at any time sell or expose within the limits of said market any wine or spirituous liquors of any kind under the penalty of forfeiting and paying for every offence Five Dollars.

16th. Resolved, That no butcher or butchers shall erect, or cause to be erected under his or their respective shambles, any box or closet, unless the same be raised six inches above the pavement, under the penalty of forfeiting and paying Five Dollars for each and every such box or closet may remain under said shambles.

17th. Resolved, That the division line between the butchers and the occupiers of the benches behind the shambles shall be drawn six inches from the inner edge of one pillar, to six inches from the inner edge of another—and no butcher shall hang any meat or other things, or place any fixture on the outside of said line, nor shall any occupier of any of said benches hang any meat or other things or place any fixture on the inside of said line, and any persons offending herein, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five Dollars for each and every such offence.

18. Resolved, That the avenues or footways for the passing of all persons from the shed parts of the Market-house to the place assigned for the station of the waggons, shall be kept open so that the same be severally opposite to the several avenues of the brick building, the said avenues and all other avenues or footways of said Market-house shall be kept free and clear of and from all obstructions whatsoever, under the penalty of one dollar for each and every offence.

19. Resolved, That all blocks, benches, tubs or other things used in the market for the accommodation of butchers, whilst occupying the shambles, shall be placed and kept within the limits of the shambles by them severally occupied and in such manner as not to extend into the Market-house farther than four feet beyond the inner edge of their respective shambles; and every butcher who shall use or occupy any of said shambles, shall on market days and on all other days before he leaves the market, place or cause to be placed all blocks and benches used by him in the market, under the plank of his shambles, so that said blocks and benches shall not extend in any way beyond the edge of the said plank, and to prevent nuisances shall collect, secure and carry away or cause to be removed from the limits of the market, all heads, feet, pluck or other offal that are or may be within the limits of his shambles or bench, under the penalty of Five Dollars for each offence—and all meat, roots, herbs and veg. table provisions offered for sale under the extended sheds of said market and all tubs, baskets and other things used in the market for the accommodation of sellers thereof, shall be placed by the several and respective owners thereof, so as not to extend beyond the edge of the benches on one side, nor extend farther than four feet inside from the kerb stone on the other side to the interruption of the purchasers passing and repassing under the said extended sheds—and if any owner or occupier of any tub, bench, meat, roots, herbs or vegetable provisions or other things used as aforesaid, shall cause or suffer the same to be placed or remain otherwise than is herein before mentioned and directed, every such person offending shall forfeit and pay for every offence Two Dollars.

20th. Resolved, That the clerk of the said market shall have full power and authority to restrain and sell any meat or provisions upon any stall rented by him, if the person renting the same or in the occupation thereof shall not pay the rent due thereon.
