

## Larger Food Program Is Seen

An expansion of the Ever Normal Granary Program into a food program designed to assure ample supplies for the United States, Great Britain and other nations resisting aggression, has been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Under the expanded program, the production of pork, dairy products, eggs and poultry will be stimulated through support of prices over the period ending June 30, 1942, at levels remunerative to producers.

Other phases of the program include:

1. Continuation of the existing corn loan program for 1941 and 1942.
  2. Continuation of the policy of making loan corn available to producers at the loan rate plus certain carrying charges.
  3. Allowing producers in the commercial corn producing area to increase corn acreage up to their usual average. (These producers would not receive corn payments.)
  4. No corn marketing quotas for the 1941 crop.
- "We have conducted intensive studies of the needs of the United States, England, and other democracies," Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, said. "We believe we have a sufficient supply of most agricultural commodities. Larger supplies of some pork, dairy and poultry products will be needed, however, in the United States, in the British Isles and in Europe for several years, irrespective of the duration of the war.
- "In Europe, foundation herds and flocks are being depleted rapidly. Even in normal times, many Americans need more of these protective food products. Because of the Ever Normal Granary, feed supplies are abundant and farmers will only be too glad to increase their production of pork, dairy products, poultry and eggs if prices make it profitable to grow more of these foods.
- "Consumers should realize that fair returns to farmers for the food products mentioned are the best assurance, not only of ample supplies, but, in the long run, of fair prices to consumers."

### THREE INJURED IN BOAT FIRE ON CHOPTANK

Fire companies from Trappe, Oxford and Easton were called Sunday to a boat fire, in which three Dorchester county sailors were injured, one of them fatally. The fire occurred on the power-boat, W. H. Tolley, of Cambridge, in the Choptank river below Trappe.

The men on board the boat at the time were Capt. Jack Aaron, Harvey Newcomb and John Hurley, all of whom leaped into the river after failing to quench the fire that developed aft. The men did not have time to launch their skiff so quickly did the fire spread.

They were picked up by the Phillips Packing Company's boat Pop-Eye, under Capt. Calvin Adams, and taken to Cambridge, where they were treated at the hospital.

Capt. Tolley, owner of the boat, was not aboard at the time. Harvey Newcomb was more seriously burned than the others and remained at the hospital. Jack Aaron and John Hurley were treated for minor injuries.

The power boat was on the Talbot county side of the river when the fire was discovered. It was believed to have started from the lighting plant.

Shortly after the crew was rescued the yacht Lotus, of Cambridge, succeeded in getting a tow line on the burning craft and beached her at Martin's Point. There firemen from Easton, Trappe and Oxford took hoses in rowboats to the still blazing boat.

As they reached her an oil tank exploded, blowing debris into the air. None of the firemen, who finally quenched the blaze after it had gutted the interior of the vessel, was injured.

The J. M. Tolley, owned by Capt. Mace Tolley, of Cambridge was en route from Cambridge to Reedville, Va., on her usual run for a cargo of river herring.


