

# OF THE SENATE.

POSTMERIDIAN, 6 O'CLOCK.

The senate met.

The bill entitled, An act to incorporate a bank to be called by the name of the Farmers' Bank of Somerset and Worcester; the resolutions in favor of William Pegegram, Kealey Tidings, Dudley Lee, Frederick Bennett, Clement Sewall and Joseph Ford, and the message relative thereto, were sent to the hoase of delegates by the clerk.

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill entitled, An act for the improvement of the Baltimore theatre. *Ordered*, That Messrs. N. Williams, MacCreery and Lloyd be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. N Williams from the committee delivers a bill entitled, An act for the improvement of the Baltimore theatre; which was read the first time and the further consideration thereof referred to the next general assembly.

The bill entitled, An additional supplement to the act entitled, An act respecting the equity jurisdiction of the county courts, was read the second time and will not pass. Sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

The bill entitled, A supplement to the act entitled, An act concerning the chancery court, was read the second time by special order, passed and sent to the house of delegates by the clerk.

On motion the question was put, Will the senate re consider the bill entitled. An act to alter, change and abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government which relate to the time and manner of electing the senate of this state, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body? Determined in the negative.

The following message was read and agreed to :

BY THE SENATE, *Jan. 3, 1812.*

*Gentlemen of the House of Delegates,*

We have considered your message requesting a re-consideration of the bill entitled, An act to alter, change and abolish all such parts of the constitution and form of government which relate to the time and manner of electing the senate of this state, and the mode of filling up vacancies in that body; and return for answer, that we have refused to re-consider said bill for the following reason. When that bill was before the senate, it was read, debated and negatived in a full house. A member has since left the senate, and a decision might now be had contrary to the will of a majority of the senate; the impropriety of such a proceeding will doubtless present itself to you without any further comment on the part of this house.
