The amendments proposed by the house of delegates to the bill entitled, an act relating to the jurisdiction and powers now vested in justices of the peace for the city of Baltimore, were taken up for consideration.

On motion of Mr. Mayer,

The following was read as an amendment to the said amendments.

Add as an amendment to the last amendment of the house.

Provided however, that this act shall not go into effect unless at the present or the next annual session or any intermediate session of the city council of Baltimore, this act shall be approved by the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, and as soon after such approval as the Governor and Council shall appoint the Aldermen, and they shall qualify as directed by this act, the then existing commissions of the justices of the peace of the city of Baltimore shall cease and have no effect—and provided further, that the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore may, after such approval at any time during the continuance of this act, increase the amount of the fees respectively chargeable by said aldermen, by an addition thereto of not more than twenty-five per centum of the amounts aforesaid, if it shall appear to the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore necessary to make such increase in order to supply the funds necessary for the salaries of said aldermen.
