

110 VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1802.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be requested to take such steps as to them shall seem proper, for collecting together and placing our military stores in the best situation for public use, and for the effectual preservation of the public arms and military accoutrements, and that they be also requested to have procured such a number of ball cartridges as they may think necessary to answer any sudden call or emergency in defence of this state.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be and they are hereby authorised to draw on the treasury of the western shore for such sum or sums of money, not exceeding five hundred dollars, as may be necessary to carry into effect the above resolution.

RESOLVED, That the governor and council be requested, and they are hereby authorised, to allow to the company of the select militia, and the company of artillery, in the city of Annapolis, such a quantity of powder and ball as they may think necessary, (for the proper exercising and training of the same,) by orders drawn for that purpose on the person who may have charge of the military stores.

On motion, ORDERED, That the committee of claims allow to Edward Roberts the sum of fifty dollars, for his trouble in taking care of the furniture in the senate chamber for the present year, and that the same be put on the journal of accounts.

A petition from Darby M'Nemara, of the city of Annapolis, stating that he is an old soldier, and incapable of procuring a livelihood, and praying relief, was preferred, read, and referred to Mr. Chapman, Mr. Ridgely and Mr. Lloyd, to consider and report thereon.

On the second reading of the further supplement to the act, entitled, An act to erect Baltimore-town, in Baltimore county, into a city, and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, the question was put, That the further consideration of the said bill be postponed until the next session of assembly? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:
